### Boys & Girls Clubs of New York serve over 131,000 youth each year

#### Our Scope of Service

- 47 Boys & Girls Club Corporations in New York
- 54 Cities in New York have at least one Boys & Girls Club
- 130 Club Sites in New York
- Average attendance in New York Clubs is 18,003 young people per day during the school year and 13,490 per day during Summer

#### Where we are Located

- 70% of club sites are located in urban communities, 10% are located in rural communities and 17% are located in suburban communities
- 3 Military Institutions have at least one Boys & Girls Club facility
- 10% of clubs are located in public housing and 31% are located in schools

#### Who we Serve

- 44% Females, 56% Males
- 33% African-American, 28% Caucasian, 25% Hispanic/Latino, 2% Asian, 1% American Indian, 6% Multi-Racial
- 5% age 5 and under, 32% age 6-9, 28% age 10-12, 20% age 13-15, and 16% age 16 and over
- 59% are eligible for free and reduced price lunch at school, 43% are in single parent households

#### Who Provides the Leadership

- 1,368 full time and 3,643 part time employees provide the program services and management of the Boys & Girls Club organizations
- 1,165 Board Members and 9,707 volunteers assist in providing program services to youth, management, administrative or general organizational support

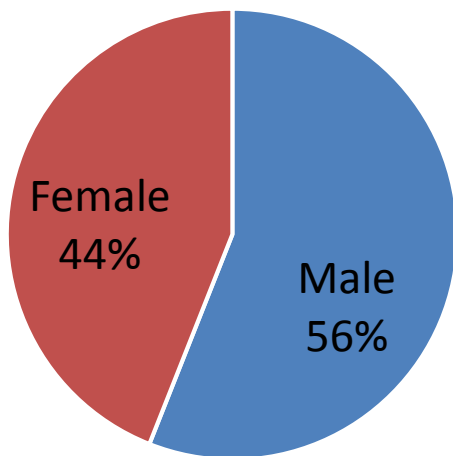

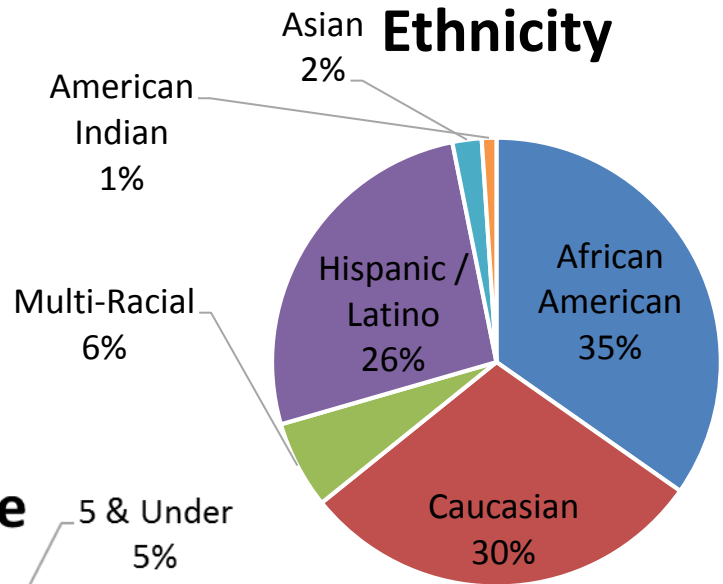

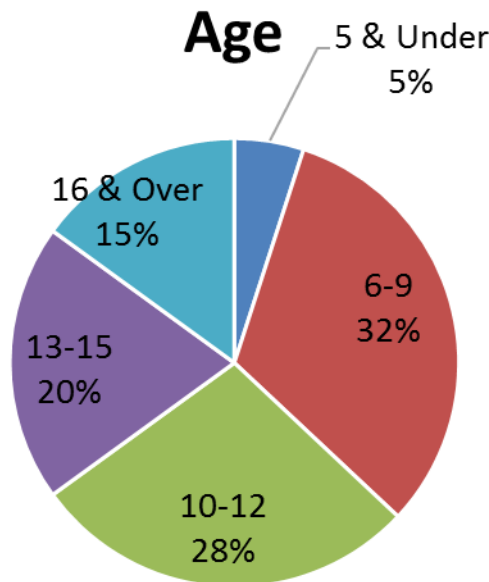
### Gender
